"Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast. It is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no records of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices in the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails." 1 Corinthians 13:4-8

This well-known scripture is one that we hear often at weddings. The Apostle Paul apparently was talking to a group of people who struggled to remember what it means to love. In our English language and culture, we use the same word for love which could mean many things. I can say I love my wife, my car, my latte, and God all with the same word. Somehow in this way, love loses its powerful meaning.

As we can see, biblical love is so much more. Now it's hard for us to love perfectly like this, because this is how God loves us. But we should strive to love one another in this way, though we may fall short.

But what strikes my attention today is how Paul first describes love as patient. *Macrothumeo* is the word in Greek. It means to be long suffering, enduring, patient. This is a slow kind of love. Not hurried or busy.

Matthew Kelly in *Slowing Down to the Speed of Joy, The Simple Art of Taking Back Your Life* writes, "God's mandate is love. The speed of our lives is incompatible with love. The busyness of our lives is incompatible with love. This busyness is not of God. Our joyless urgency is not of God. We have brought this breathlessness upon ourselves, but we can choose a new path...Busy reduces our capacity to love...We need to slow down so we can learn to love again." (40-41)

I think Kelly is on to something, which is why we are spending time in worship and in our Adult Sunday school class learning about the importance of slowing down. More specifically, we are asking how can we slow down to the speed of Jesus. Jesus was never in a hurry, as busy as he was. But we never get a sense that he was ever too busy for the people he encountered along the way. He was slow. He was intentional. He was rested. He was love incarnate.

Those of us wishing to take following Jesus seriously should take inventory of our lives and ask how can we slow down to a speed that more reflects his pace and rhythm. As the good ole song proclaims, "They will know we are Christians not by our speed or busyness for God, but by our love."

And that all seems like a good lesson to me, to keep doing what I know I want to do, and if I gain any praise for it, realize Who is really deserving of that praise, because I am only doing what I feel called to do, and enjoy doing! So, for 2026, my word is journey. That seems almost too easy. My whole life I have been learning that my goal isn't the end point. Rather, my goal is to enjoy the journey along the way. I first learned that about taking actual journeys. Don't just arrive. Enjoy the unexpected events along the way. Enjoy the new people along the way. So, when I get to the end, it is all the sweeter for the surprises along the way.

ON MY NIGHTSTAND



In this season of learning how to slow down to the speed of Jesus, I thought it might be helpful to share some of the resources shaping my thinking and preaching. I encourage you to pick one or several of them up and learn from me as I learn from Jesus. This is Jesus' unhurried and unburdened yoke.

John Mark Comer, *The Ruthless Elimination of Hurry*. My main resource for this winter/spring preaching series. Comer addresses the vital need for people to slow down if they want to be serious followers of Jesus. He introduces four main spiritual practices for unhurrying our lives. Silence and Solitude. Sabbath. Simplicity. And Slowing. Ok that's five, but these disciplines are intricately interwoven together.

Matthew Kelly, *Slowing Down to the Speed of Joy, The Simple Art of Taking Back Your Life*. Kelly spent thirty years rushing around from one thing to the next. Until he realized that busy is not our friend. It is a toxicity that leaves us anxious, overwhelmed, discouraged, exhausted, stressed, inadequate and resentful. Slowing down is a way of life that Jesus practiced, and so should we.

Alan Fadling, *An Unhurried Life, Following Jesus' Rhythms of Work and Rest*. Beginning with his confession, pastor and spiritual director Alan Fadling describes his journey out of the fast lane and into the rhythms of Jesus. Following the framework of Jesus' earthly life, Fadling shows how the work of "Unhurrying" is central to spiritual development.

Alan Fadling, *A Year of Slowing Down, Daily Devotions for Unhurried Living*. Alan Fadling has spent years coaching leaders and communities on how to live an unhurried life, teaching that productivity is not our chief end. Designed to center you in God's loving presence, *A Year of Slowing Down* offers six devotions for each week of the year. Each day begins with a Scripture passage followed by a short reading and reflection question.

Leighton Ford, *The Attentive Life, Discerning God's Presence in All Things*. Distractions, fear and busyness were keeping Leighton Ford from seeing God's work in and around him. So he began a journey of longing for God. And it started with paying attention. Ford invites us to journey with him. Using the rich tradition of praying the hours, Ford helps you pay attention to God's work in and around you throughout each day and in different seasons of life.

Dale Gish, *Beloved: A Journey of Prayer*. Gish is a spiritual director and Ignatian retreat director who invites us on a journey to learn how to pray with scripture in an Ignatian style. You will learn to welcome God's loving gaze. You will be challenged to experience God's love in new and different ways. But most importantly, God will meet you with great love, as God delights to do.





Reading Thru the Bible...

The Bible Recap is a 365-Day Chronological Reading Plan you can start any day of the year. Reading through the Bible chronologically takes you through the story of Scripture as it happened. It helps you to see where and how it all fits together.

When you read through the entire Bible it helps you see the big picture of God & what He is trying to tell us about Himself.

Hopefully you are off to a great start in 2026! You've already tackled the challenging book of Job and the whole book of Genesis! Maybe you are starting to develop a habit and an excitement for the Word of God and for what might come next in your reading!

If you are not able to read every day you can keep track of where you are by marking the boxes or just read on the days that you can. The most important thing is to keep reading and don't give up! An option to reading would be to listen to the Bible on an app such as YouVersion®. 

UPDATE: FUTURE FOCUSED ENVISIONING COMMITTEE

After the very busy Advent season the Future Focused Envisioning Committee is back together and making steady progress toward preparing for interviews with our Advisory members of the congregation. During the last couple of months, we have discussed various elements of worship that have included the act of worship and practicing our faith, the role of children and youth in worship, the role of deacons in worship, the meaning and practice of music in our worship, the support functions for worship such as AV support, the physical space we use for worship, and the role of Elders in worship. Prior to discussing each of these worship elements we review scripture passages, the Presbyterian Book of Order and what it says about the element, and online articles and readings from books. From these references, a series of discussion questions are assembled for the committee to use as a guide during the meeting. Here is an example of discussion questions we have used:

- We need to know "why" we come together on Sunday mornings at 10:15. We call it a "worship" service, but our tag line says we come to "be fed". Are we gathering to worship God or to be taught and encouraged in his ways or both?
- Should Cascades congregation have an active and conscious role building disciples of children and youth through worship? What does/might that look like?
- How does the music we play during worship help members worship? How does it add to their worship?

Important roles for Deacons and Ruling Elders during worship include reading scripture, prayers of intercession, receiving the offering, serving communion and charge to service. Should our Deacons assume a greater role in worship beyond serving communion?

Our next step in February is to start assembling our Advisory members for 1-1.5 hour Zoom meetings to discuss some of these discussion questions to get more thoughts and ideas beyond just the committee. Once these Advisory member meetings are completed we will combine these thoughts and ideas with those of the committee and develop recommendations for the future of worship at Cascades.

If you are contacted to participate in these Advisory member meetings we hope you will say YES! We need your support to ensure we have a well rounded view of where we are in worship today and where we can move worship into the future. Laura Livingston, Worship Arts Elder
