

"All kind of animals, birds, reptiles, and creatures of the sea are being tamed and have been tamed by humans, but no one can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison." James 3:7-8

As I'm sure everyone was, but I was particularly shocked and deeply saddened at the recent assassination attempt against the former president, Donald Trump. While these sorts of events are nothing new on the stage of American politics, they still catch us off guard when they do happen. How did we get to this place? Regardless of how we feel about a particular candidate's political persuasion, this kind of barbaric behavior has absolutely no place in American society today.

The one thing I hear being repeated on both sides of the political divide is that we must tone down the political rhetoric. No more vitriolic hate speech. No more unadulterated lies. No more character bashing. Its time to actually debate policy in a spirit of mutual cordiality that benefits all Americans regardless of which candidate they choose.

James, the brother of Jesus, was very clear when he talked about the power of the tongue. He likened it to a small rudder able to change the course of a large ship or a small spark able to set an entire forest ablaze. It can be used either as a tool to praise God or a weapon to destroy others.

As a preacher, I am very aware of the power of words. I have to be very careful of what I say and don't stay from the pulpit. My aim is to always build up, edify, and challenge the Church in its faith, whether in word or in deed. I also know that as the head of staff and moderator of our session that my words are responsible for settling the corporate culture within our leadership. People will mimic the words and behaviors that I use.

In his Letter to the Colossians, the Apostle Paul exhorted, "Let the word of Christ dwell in us richly as we teach and admonish one another with all wisdom, and as you sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, whether in word or in deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him." (Colossians 3:16-17)

So may we all take a moment to regroup and think seriously about the words that come out from our mouths. May we realize that we have the power to sow seeds of love or seeds of hate. And as the song that we often sing states, may "People we know we are Christians by our love."

If we aren't hearing words of love coming from our politician's mouths, then maybe we should not vote for them. But let us first check our own eyes for logs before we attempt to remove specks of dust from another's eyes.

# **SCAMMERS**

Once again scam artists are trying to take advantage of others by falsely claiming to be someone else over fraudulent text messages, emails, or social media communications. It behooves us all to be vigilant and know what signs to look for. The Oregon Department of Justice encourages us to look out for these six signs:

1. Scammers Want You To Wire Money. You may be asked to wire money or purchase pre-paid debit cards.

- 2. Scammers Tell You To Keep It "Secret."
- 3. Scammers Make It Sound Too Good To Be True.
- 4. Scammers Contact You "Out Of The Blue."
- 5. Scammers Claim There Is An "Emergency."
- 6. Scammers Ask For Your Personal Information.

One other clue is to look at the originating phone number or email address. If it does not match up with person you know, then it is most likely a scam. The key here is trust your gut instinct and if you get a strange communication from someone you supposedly know, reach out and speak to them directly. Then report it to the Washington State Attorney General's Office at www.atg.wa.gov

# SPOTLIGHT ON OUR MEMBERS

Eight years ago, they met on a blind date in Tacoma through an online dating site. Their journeys to that point certainly differed from each other. Born and raised in Pittsburgh, PA, he was the son of Hungarian immigrants who had fled during the 1956 revolution against the Soviet Union. She, born in Barbourville, KY, was raised in Appalachia and in the San Joaquin Valley of California. As the daughter of two teachers living in provided housing on the grounds of the migrant workers town school in Five Points, CA, she took an early interest in learning and in music, which her father taught.

Laura Livingston obtained her bachelor's degree in criminal justice from Fresno State, her master's in public administration from Golden Gate University, and her PhD in curriculum and instructional design from Florida State University. She made a career

of the US Army, both active duty and reserve, retiring as a Lieutenant Colonel. Her experience developing training for soldiers led her to earn her doctorate, enabling her to provide various content for multiple companies, both for-profit and non-profit. She has lived "all over," including a three-year stint in Germany, and has traveled extensively in Europe.

Tom Holczer found his profession as a draftsman when the job was done manually, then rapidly advanced to become a Programmable Logic Controller (PLC) automation engineer and an electrical/instrumentation maintenance engineer. His work programming industrial control systems brought him from Pittsburgh to Tacoma, with Southwest Missouri and Shanghai, China in between. He married and had a family early in life, so work, travel, and family took precedence over the engineering degree he desired. Still, he excelled in his vendor-provided training as well as being educated at two other schools.

"Ultimately, Laura found a job opportunity in Seattle and settled in Puyallup. Tom's life changed dramatically after a divorce and having been laid off from a Portland steel mill. He relocated to Tacoma taking a job there. Thus, Tom and Laura, having met in Tacoma, recently moved to Vancouver as Tom now readies for retirement in February."

Even though Laura and Tom both have traveled extensively, they still desire to "travel anywhere and everywhere". Both take pleasure in their Labradoodle, Piper. Laura enjoys researching her family genealogy. They appreciate Cascades Church's smaller size and its sense of community. Laura likes being a part of the choir ministry. We at Cascades welcome them and appreciate their willingness to serve in our congregation.

Arriving later than expected on Sunday after 16 hours of travel due to several long layovers didn't help. No time for jet lag with alarms set to get up early to eat breakfast then greet all 160+ students at 6:50 am Monday as they entered the school to begin their week.

At 6:50 am Monday, God's presence became very real. Every child pre-k through 12th grade walked through our line-up to give each of us a hug. Immediately, the daunting task ahead was erased from our minds. We all went into "God" mode and began preparing for VBS.

Greeting the students became the beginning of our daily routine for the week. Through those 160+ daily hugs, we all felt God's presence and confidence that VBS would be a success. It was more than a success. Not only did we bless the New Hope School, they blessed us in return. Seeing the joy on the children's faces was indescribable, especially when realizing that "joy" as we know it is something they seldom experience.

Thank you to all who supported us with your prayers and donations to provide this international mission opportunity.

Alfonso and Mara who lead New Hope School are extremely grateful to Cascades for sharing our love of God...making it so much more true for their students and their families. Their hope is that this is the first of many VBS mission trips. While the team may not always be the same, it will always be God's dream team making a difference in the lives of the poorest of the poor families living in the Riviera Hernandez community of San Pedro Sula, Honduras.
