

"God defends the cause of the fatherless and the widow, and loves the alien, giving him food and clothing. And you are to love those who are aliens, for you yourselves were aliens in Egypt." Deuteronomy 10:18

Today on World Refugee Day, we remember the 130 million people the UN Refugee Agency expects to be forcibly displaced from their homes or stateless by the end of 2024. 130 million! That's a lot of people without a home or a safe place to raise their children. And of that 130 million, more than half of them are under the age of 18. So often its the innocent children that suffer by the decisions made by adults in their governmental leadership.

I am particularly mindful of this fact as I remember the two Afghan families that we supported a few years back who were fleeing persecution from the Taliban. It was not that they were leaving Afghanistan to forge a better life for their families in America. They were forced to leave. The decisions were simple...stay and die, or leave and live. They chose life.

It's been nearly three years now and both of those families have since moved away and resettled in a new community in northern California. We were blessed to recently hear that the two eldest daughters of one family had just graduated from high school and are planning to go to college. Imagine that. Two young girls who would not have been allowed to finish high school under the oppressive restrictions of the Taliban have had their lives radically changed through the way Cascades answered God's call to love the alien in our midst.

The Old Testament Scripture above reminds us that we too were once aliens living in a strange land. The truth is that anyone whose ancestors once immigrated to the United States of America are still aliens living on other people's lands. God invites us as God's people to remember this so that we maintain a posture of humility, gratitude, and hospitality toward those who are likewise resettling among us as new aliens in this land we call home.

Now I will be the first to admit that we have big problems in our country with immigration. I will also admit that I don't have all the answers of how to solve such problems. I do wonder, however, if part of the solution lies in helping make life more equitable, safe, and prosperous in their homelands. A team of us have just returned from a mission trip where we served the poorest of the world's poor at New Hope Opportunities School in San Pedro Sula, Honduras. If you saw the conditions under which most of these students live, then it would be clear why people trek a thousand miles by foot with the hopes of resettling in our American land of milk and honey.

What New Hope Opportunities School provides impoverished students and their families is the hope through quality education, with God's help, that they can escape the grips of poverty and make a better life for them and their families in Honduras.

# SAFETY & SECURITY PLAN IN THE EVENT OF A HEART ATTACK

As part of our Safety and Security Plan we will be bringing monthly tips about how to handle certain emergency situations. Today we'll be talking about what to do if it appears that someone has had a heart attack during the service.

First: The person closest to the injured person should direct someone to call 911. Don't just say, "Someone call 911," say "Bob, call 911." This accomplishes two things. No one will think that someone else is going to do it and it minimizes the calls to emergency services. Art will man the front doors to give emergency services access to the building. Clear the chairs away from around victim. This will allow us and emergency services to have more room to work. There is aspirin in the two first aid kits. There is one in the kitchen in the cabinet to the right of the sink and one in the entryway over the bench. DO NOT ADMINISTER ASPIRIN UNLESS A HEALTH CARE PROVIDER INSTRUCTS YOU TO DO SO. IF THE VICTIM REQUESTS ONE IT'S OKAY TO GIVE ONE.

If the person doesn't have a pulse or isn't breathing start CPR. By this time a member of the safety team should be by your side and can start CPR if assistance is need. If the Automated External Defibrillator (AED) is needed it is in the narthex over the bench. Again, a trained volunteer should be helping by this time but if no one is there the directions are with the device. The AED is programmed to give a shock only when needed.

Emergency personnel won't need our help, except perhaps to open doors. They will exit through the main doors in order to use the ramp or through the front side door if that's closer to the ambulance.

Pastor Chris will direct members of the congregation who had to move to allow us to move the chairs to another area in the sanctuary, to other chairs in the sanctuary. The service will continue as scheduled.

Her father, tragically, died in a work-related incident when Joan was five years old, so Joan dauntingly adjusted to life with a new father when her mother re-married. After graduating from Willamette High School in Eugene, she enrolled at Seattle Pacific College (now University). A freshman, she met sophomore Ron and, after two quarters, her life changed. She took her "MRS degree" and, with Ron, raised three children: daughters Ronna and Lorri, and son, Mel. Ron earned his teaching degree, eventually becoming an administrator at Whitworth University in Spokane. As a result, Joan was able to earn her art degree from Whitworth, tuition-free. She graduated in 1985 along with her son!



Besides her role as homemaker, Joan has also served as an administrative assistant. She has lived in Tacoma, Hoodsport, and Shelton, WA, besides her time in Eugene,

Seattle, and Spokane. With her husband, she traveled to Asia, South America, and Mexico. As for traveling now, she feels she has "been there, done that," but still she has agreed to go with her sisters on a cruise to New Zealand next February. Joan enjoys working with crafts, gardening, and sewing.

While living in Tacoma, WA, and attending University Place Presbyterian Church, Ron and Joan purchased their summer house, a manufactured home above Kokanee Lake, near Hoodsport. Five years later, in 2002, they retired there full-time. Joan "transformed the grounds from dandelions to rhododendrons." After 15 years, maintenance becoming a chore and Ron needing more medical care, they moved to Shelton, close to medical facilities and the church they had been attending. In 2020, just before the Covid lockdown began, Ron passed away.

Joan is blessed with grandchildren. Alex is in Galveston, TX, working towards a doctorate. Emma Joy lives in Lexington, KY. Jack and wife Olivia reside in Folsom, CA. Abby and husband Collin are in Juneau, AK. Grace is 11 years old, living with parents Lorri and Tom and Aunt Ronna in Hampstead, NC. Son, Mel, resides in Colorado Springs, CO.

So, alone in Shelton, her children and grandchildren scattered across the country, Joan chose to move to Vancouver to be near her three younger sisters, brother, and their spouses. Searching for a Christ-centered church that prays, she began watching the livestreaming from Sunday services at Cascades church. That led her to attend in person, where she enjoys the friendliness and community of the people here.


meeting. Grateful to have this group of elders who oversee all the details of caring for the church and it's members. Important to rest as we attend to many different matters.
